## **Editor's Note**

Dear Readers,

As 2023 draws to a close, the Salem Audubon Society, like other non-profit organizations, reviews the past year's success and imagines how to serve its members better. To plan upcoming activities and strategize ways to be a more inclusive group, the Board of Directors assesses chapter operations and financial needs to be sure we are meeting our misson goal of connecting people to nature through activities and education at little or no cost.

Unfortunately, inflation has affected us like everyone else. So, despite keeping dues unchanged for nearly a decade, we must now increase our 2024 annual membership dues by \$10.

Beginning with our February membership renewal period, Individual membership dues will be \$45, and Family membership dues will be \$60. All digital information we produce will be freely available online, and those who wish to receive a print version of The Kestrel will now pay \$15 for the 11 issues they will receive by mail.

We support our chapter work in many ways. Your membership dues represent an essential part of our annual budget, and say how many of you consider our efforts valuable in your life. Your increased participation in our activities, including recurring field trips, Birders' Night gatherings, the Christmas Bird Count, and other unique events, prove you believe your membership is worth the price.

Keeping you informed about our work and activities is essential, and the cost of production and delivery of The Kestrel newsletter – in print and online – is typically an increased expense we face.

The print edition of The Kestrel, mailed to members who pay a small premium for the service, makes chapter news available to those without a digital device. First-class postage costs have risen 43.5 percent since 2012, and printing costs, even with a non-profit discount, have shown similar increases.

Our website (https://www.salemaudubon.org) is our primary means of timely information sharing with our members. We average over 700 page views daily, helping us meet our mission by including content that improves nature exploration and birding activities. It also lets members read an interactive version of The Kestrel, download and print copies, and search back issues to re-read stories they value. Freely accessible to online readers, website production and publication costs are rising, too.

And, of course, the usual expenses of business operations, including rent for office and storage space, utilities, supplies, utilities, employee salary and benefits, like everything else, have also gone up.

## **Salem Audubon Society Field Trips**

Salem Audubon Society (SAS) field trips are open to the public, and we have a mix of experienced and new birders. Our field trips are an excellent way to become familiar with Oregon birds, experience new places and meet new friends. We don't charge for our trips, but there may be a small fee involved, such as a parking pass, depending on our destination. We encourage participants to be vaccinated. Some leaders request participants carpool to reduce our carbon footprint so please contribute to your driver to help cover costs. Masking when inside the vehicle is up to individual drivers.

SAS field trips vary in both driving distance and walking length. Specific field trip descriptions will note trail conditions (uneven, paved, etc), meeting places and times, often include anticipated species to be encountered and directions for carpooling (if applicable). If you need to leave the trip earlier than the scheduled time, please let your leader know!

If you read this field trip intro, you may notice it is different than earlier versions. Beginning in 2024, all field trips will be listed as SAS Monthly Field Trips in order by date. Best wishes for a safe and happy holiday season!

#### SAS JANUARY FIELD TRIPS

## Wednesday, January 3, 2024, 9:00 AM to 12:00 PM – Minto-Brown Island Park


(Upcoming – Thursday, February 1 and Sunday March 3, both at 9:00 AM) Leaders: Mike Unger (503) 930-8998, Tim Johnson (503) 507-8552

Celebrate the New Year with our regular walk the following Wednesday! This park is highly accessible with 29 miles of trails – both paved and soft. The access to habitat makes it a remarkable park for birders. Leaves are gone from shrubs and deciduous trees. Food, in berries, fallen apples, cherries and grass seeds are a main attraction, with hedges and woodland that provide cover for birds. Chickadee flocks with nuthatches and Brown Creeper, scavenge for insects in bark and lichen;

thrushes, waxwings and Yellow-rumped Warblers will be in the trees and fallen fruit. Increased winter raptor species, including falcons, will perch for hunting, providing good views and study. The oxbows and fields attract Dusky Canada Geese, Greater White-fronted Geese and many other waterfowl which acquire their best plumage in winter. Fields and waterway edges offer shorebirds such as Killdeer and Wilson's Snipe. We will always look for the unusual in this park, such as Western Bluebird, American Pipit, Red Crossbill and Snow Goose.

Meet at 9:00 AM at Parking Lot #3 (the last parking lot in the park). Dress for weather, bring water, snacks and binoculars! Trails may be uneven so wear appropriate footwear and plan for considerable walking. We plan to be finished around noon.

Directions: From River Road South, turn west at the signal at Minto Island Road and proceed to the last parking lot. Please do not leave valuables in your vehicle and confirm anything inside is out of sight.



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#### Sunday, January 14, 2024, 9:00 AM to 12:00 PM - Ankeny National Wildlife Refuge

(Upcoming – Sunday, February 18 and Tuesday, March 12 at 9:00 AM) Leaders: Mike Unger (503) 930-8998, Tim Johnson (503) 507-8552

The Refuge berms and interior ponds are closed during winter to prevent disturbance of waterfowl. But we can visit the loop around the Refuge, including several pullouts and the parking areas at Pintail and Eagle marshes. We can expect migrating raptors during winter months and they will be more easily seen in snags and leafless trees. We will always look for visiting shorebirds on the mudflats, including peeps, dowitchers and Dunlin feeding and moving in large swarms above the water and field ponds. If we find American Pipit and Western Meadowlark, we will look for Horned Lark in the fields. Now is the time to look through flocks of visiting sparrows, ducks and geese and watch for swans when rains replenish the water levels. Because the travel perimeter includes ditches as well as hedgerows with fruit trees, we will search all sparrow flocks looking for nuthatches, winter warblers and rarities like Northern Shrike or Lewis's Woodpecker.

Meet at Ankeny Hill Nature Center (AHNC) Parking Lot 9:00 AM. There are facilities at this location. We will start here before visiting Pintail Marsh and other locations. Bring water, binoculars and a snack! Trails can be uneven so please wear appropriate footwear. We anticipate finishing by noon.

Directions: From Salem, take I-5 south to the Ankeny Hill Road exit (Exit 243) and turn right (west). At the Ankeny Hill Road/Wintel Road intersection bear right and continue on Ankeny Hill Road straight (west) approximately 2.2 miles to the AHNC Visitor Center entrance which will be on your left. An alternate route from Salem is to take Liberty Road south to Ankeny Hill Road, then turn left and continue about 0.4 miles to the AHNC Visitor Center entrance which will be on your right. Please do not leave valuables in your vehicle and confirm anything inside is out of sight.

#### Wednesday, January 24, 2024, 9:00 AM to 12:00 PM - Sauvie Island

Leader: Harry Fuller (791) 312-1735

Join self-confessed "obsessive craniac" Harry Fuller on this Wednesday at Sauvie Island to listen and look for Sandhill Cranes and Trumpeter Swans among the myriads of smaller, quieter birds from raptors to ducks to sparrows! Bring lunch and water. We will bird until 3 PM or so.

Meet in the parking lot of the Cracker Barrel Grocery, 15005 NW Sauvie Island Road, Portland at 9:00 AM. A parking permit is required to park in all wildlife areas on the island. Daily permits are \$10.00, annual permits are \$30.00. Permits can be purchased at the Cracker Barrel Grocery or on-line from ODFW at Buying an ODFW Wildlife Area parking permit | Oregon Department of Fish & Wildlife (myodfw.com)

Directions: Sauvie Island is slightly over 1.5 hours from Salem. Once you cross the bridge stay on the main road, bear left and the grocery will be on your left.

#### Monday, January 29, 2024, 9:00 AM to 11:30 AM - Champoeg State Park

If you like Acorn Woodpeckers and Western Bluebirds, this beautiful state park is one of the best spots in our area to find them any time of year! We'll walk about 2.5 miles through oak trees and a mixed deciduous/conifer forest where we can also expect to encounter Varied Thrush, Hermit Thrush, and various finch and sparrow species as well. This park also hosts a number of raptors during the winter months, including Red-tailed Hawk, Northern Harrier, American Kestrel, Merlin, Cooper's Hawk, and Sharp-shinned Hawk. This walk should last about 2.5 hours. Hope to see you there!

Meet in the Oak Grove Day Use Parking Lot. A valid Oregon State Parks Pass is required, a \$5.00 day pass can be purchased on site. Please bring water and binoculars! We should be finished by noon.

Directions: This historic State Park is about 23 miles north of Salem. From Salem, take I-5 north to the Brooks exit (exit 263) and turn left (west) on Brooklake Road NE, proceed to River Road NE and turn right (north), take French Prairie Road NE (straight ahead) and continue to the park entrance.

#### Saturday, February 10, 2024, 9:30 AM to 12:00 PM – Exploring Raptors: Birds of Prey!

The most popular class (Raptor ID) that the Salem chapter of the Audubon Society holds locally is coming up on Saturday, February 10, 2024, and reservations are required. The workshop will be held at the Ankeny Hill Nature Center located at 130 Ankeny Hill Rd SE, Jefferson, OR. This will be an IN-PERSON CLASS and participants will learn about raptors that call Oregon home. Raptors discussed include hawks, eagles, vultures, osprey, falcons, and harriers. This workshop will highlight the best sites in the area to look for them and offer participants tips for identifying these birds of prey.

Participants will: learn to distinguish a Red-tailed Hawk from a Red-shouldered Hawk; find out how fast falcons can fly; discover why vultures never get sick when they ingest dead carcasses; and learn how to ID raptors by sight and sound.

The cost for the workshop is \$10 per person with all proceeds going to Salem Audubon Society. The class includes handouts for future reference. #### Wednesday, February 14, 2024, 9:00 AM to 12:00 PM - Baskett Slough

Leader. Harry Fuller (791) 312-1735

Established in 1965 as part of the Willamette Valley NWR Complex, Baskett Slough is primarily managed to provide wintering habitat for the Dusky Canada Goose, a subspecies of Canada Goose with very limited summer and winter ranges. This refuge also provides wetland and woodland sanctuary for migrant and resident wildlife, including Fender's Blue Butterfly, once thought extinct but rediscovered here! We are meeting at the Rich Guadagno Trailhead, just off Coville Road, near the center of the refuge. Rich, a former manager at this NWR, perished in September 11, 2001 on United Flight 93. Walk and experience the flora and fauna who call this part of the refuge home. From the overlook you can see wetlands throughout the southern part of the refuge. We will drive to Cackler and Taverner marshes and check out the wintering migrants, some of whom come in huge numbers. Raptors frequent the area as well in all seasons. Come spend a Valentine's Day morning engaging in one of your favorite activities!

Meet at the Rich Guadagno Trailhead Parking Lot on Coville Road at 9:00 AM. Restroom and picnic facilities are available. Bring water, binoculars, a snack and dress for the weather. Trails may be uneven so please use appropriate footwear. We will finish around noon.

Directions: From Salem, take Hwy 22 west to 99W. Proceed north to Coville Road and turn west (left). Continue to the trailhead which will be on your right. Restroom and picnic facilities are available.
